What will the questions look like?

How can I revise?

What key moments can I pick out?

Whole play references for the 12 marker

Act 1

- Opening of the engagement party between Sheila and Gerald
- The Inspector enters
- Mr Birling confession – request for more money from working classes
- Sheila confession – the day at Milwards
- End of Act One – Leading to Gerald confession

Act 2

- Gerald confession – meeting Daisy Renton
- Mrs Birling confession – Eva Smith getting help from the women's organization
- Leading to Eric's confession

Act 3

- Eric confession – relationship with Daisy Renton
- Inspector fire, blood, anguish speech – exit of Inspector
- Family questioning Inspector's identity
- Final phone call – announcement of girls suicide

Context Takeaways for the 9 marker

First written in 1945

First performed in London - 1946

Original director was Basil Dean - had a green box setting

Audience critiqued too much focus on the moral message

Priestley wanted the audience to 'judge' the action and encourage the audience to think actively about moral message

1945- was a turning point for Britain to give hope for the Future. Vital point post War to make a change to society

What will the questions look like?

Question a) i)

a (i) You are a performer playing Mrs Birling.

Give two ways in which you would use verbal characterisation to play her in this extract. You must provide a reason for each suggestion. (4 marks)

Question a) ii)

There are specific choices in this extract for performers.

You are going to play Sheila. She is feeling frustrated by her parents views on the investigation.

As a performer, give three suggestions of how you would use performance skills to show this. You must provide a reason for each suggestion. (6 marks)

Question b) i)

There are specific choices in this extract for a director.

As a director, discuss how you would use one of the **production elements** below to bring this extract to life for your audience.

You should refer to the context in which the text was **created and first performed**.

Choose one of the following:

- Props/stage furniture
- Lighting
- Sound

(9 marks)

Question b) ii)

Sheila is beginning to take responsibility for her part that she played and feels frustrated by her parents approach to the investigation.

As a director, discuss how the performer playing this role might demonstrate her **changing attitude and reputation** to the audience in this extract and **in the complete play**.

You must consider:

- **voice**
- *physicality*
- stage directions and stage space

Question C)

There are specific choices in this extract for designers. Discuss how you would use one of the design elements below to enhance the production of this extract for the audience. Choose one of the following:

Lighting

Props/Staging

Stage furniture

How should I structure longer answer questions?

Your structure 14 MARKER should be:

1. REWRITE the question: As a designer, I would use set to enhance the production and *emphasise the wrong-doings* of the Birling family. This is the moment when the Birlings have made their confessions and are being interrogated by the Inspector.
2. Paragraph structure:
 - Give your idea – I would design to have a mirror position upstage positioned centrally and hung on the cyclorama
 - Link to the extract – this would be particularly used on the line of... from Birling to show that he is reflecting but moves away from the mirror quickly
 - Justification – the use of the mirror would show the need for the Birlings to reflect...
 - Audience – this would emphasise to the audience the *wrong-doings* of the Birlings and that they need to take time to reflect and think about what they have contributed to in society, linking with Priestley's original intentions of us all taking collective responsibility.

(you need 3 of these paragraphs, with 3 clear different ideas – be sure to develop your answer by mentioning the audience!)
